European Justice Commissioner, Viviane Reding, is reported, in a recent [Computer Weekly article](#), to have said that 72% of European citizens are concerned about the privacy of their data.

The risks to security have been identified by the European Commission to relate particularly to the storage of data by companies using cloud-based solutions and the uncontrolled 'harvesting' of that data either by providers or as a result of security breaches. This has led to the introduction of the [European General Data Protection Regulation](#).

Computer Weekly in introducing its guide [Cyber Security 2016 and Beyond](#) makes the statement that:

"Cyber risks to businesses increasingly feature in the news as a growing number of companies are targeted by attacks aimed at stealing personal and intellectual property data, but despite this coverage, studies show many companies are still ill-equipped to deal with these attacks. Traditional security approaches and technologies are no longer enough to tackle new threats"

The Parliament's version contains increased fines up to 4% turnover, also companies and organisations could be liable to a fine of €100m!!!!"*
